1. Clean Energy in the 21st Century

The options for a clean, sustainable future – A Major Lecture in West Cumbria

The facts are stark: within the next few years, the UK will become net gas importer as North Sea reserves finally run out, coal technology isn't really working (and we import anyway) and renewable energy solutions are far too small and costly to have serious impact. No-one loves nuclear energy and energy efficiency won't save enough in time to meet the continuing rise in energy demanded by all of us. Plus the continuing pressure to reduce carbon dioxide emissions in an attempt to stabalise the increasingly erratic weather systems – are we doomed??

Against this dramatic scenario, Professor Ian Fells CBE, FEng, FRSE, FInstE, of Newcastle University and Fells Associates, will deliver a major lecture outlining how a mix of renewable and nuclear energy will become the way ahead. Professor Fells is uniquely qualified to comment on fundamental energy issues, and is dedicated to improving public understanding of science via the media. He has made over 400 radio and TV programmes, and has made authoritative contributions to the energy policy debate. He is an influential advisor to many Select Committees and a highly acclaimed commentator on energy, as well as an outstanding public speaker.

Organised by the IMechE West in conjunction with the British Nuclear Engineering Society, the lecture will be held in building B111 at the Sellafield North Gate on Wednesday, October 23rd, starting at 7.00pm. Admission is free and is open to all interested persons.

6. Being Moses – A Beacon Of Success!

How the Whitehaven Harbour Regeneration Project parted the seas and saved the Town

The latest event of the IMechE West Cumbria branch was an excellent presentation by Terry Ponting, Chief Executive of the Whitehaven Development Company. Organised in conjunction with the Westlakes Research Institute, the presentation gave a splendid account of the power of engineering in re-shaping natural forces.

The background to the project, which has completely re-vitalised the historic core of the West Cumbrian port of Whitehaven, was fascinating. Whitehaven had suffered from a moribund and decaying harbour for many years, and also from periodic town flooding due to poor drainage from the surrounding landscape, rivers and culverts – the last time as recently as 1997.

An effective engineering solution was clearly necessary, and tenders were invited to produce schemes to provide a lock of permanent water in the harbour, some 42 hectares, together with the inevitable price tag. The schemes suggested that £8 million would be needed. The ingenuity of addressing the various local, regional, national and European fundholders to justify the project against each of their different criteria was clearly evident – from employment and tourism to the Millennium Commission 'wow' factor. The final £2 million was found, however, by justifying the scheme as a flood defence system for the town; in the event of warnings about impending heavy downfall, the harbour level can now be lowered to provide a reservoir for water draining from the town! The National Rivers Authority were the last piece of the jigsaw to provide the funding.

Then began the engineering in earnest. The project called for the largest 'coffer' dam ever built in a UK harbour, the 'coffers' being used to hold sand to weight the structure down – some 22,000 tonnes total weight. The difficulties of dealing with a listed structure built in 1634, presented many challenges, both bureaucratic and technical, from the colour of the grout material to the structural integrity of the very original foundations.

The building of the dam and the provision of the huge hinge and adjustable seal systems for the inner and outer lock gates was beautifully illustrated by a series of slides. From driving the first steel piles into the sea-bed, to the removal of a colossal volume of material to provide the foundations for the huge new concrete structure, every stage of the project was covered. The challenge of the final precision installation of the gates from a massive floating crane to fixed pivots, with each gate weighing over 40 tonnes, was remarkable. The last technical hurdle was the degree to which even the massive new structure 'settled' once the temporary protection was removed to reveal the final form that now graces the harbour.

Perhaps the most rewarding aspect of such a project has been to see the difference it has made to the lives of so many people. Over 10,000 gathered for a wonderful open-air concert this summer, flanked by the tall ships that are now able to safely use the harbour. A 150-berth marina is virtually full, and is shortly to be expanded – none of this would have come about if it were not for the engineering courage and determination to re-shape the natural forces that would otherwise have destroyed the old harbour. Such a project must also balance the needs for an effective solution within a properly funded business plan. In this, the Whitehaven harbour project is a beacon of success.
